Since Fort Ord was an Army training center for over 40 years, military munitions including rockets, mortars, and other explosives were used at many areas on the former Fort Ord. The areas where ordnance and explosives were used are closed to the public and we have an ongoing program to find and remove ordnance and explosive items. While we do this work, it is important that our neighbors, especially children, understand the danger of these devices and the importance of staying out of posted "off-limits" areas. It is also critical to know what to do if ordnance and explosives are found.

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Please consider making time for this presentation to the children of your school.
